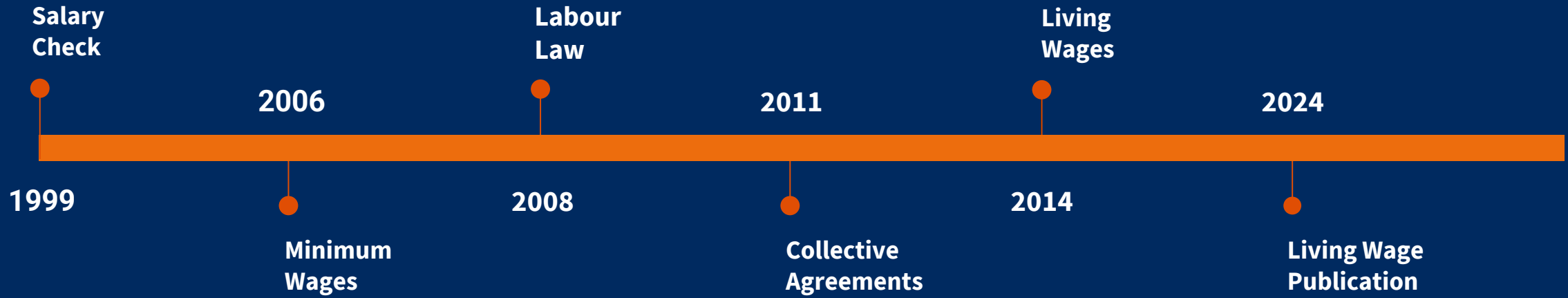

WageIndicator's Goal

To provide labour market information for all countries in the world

Why are we publishing Living Wage estimates?

Provide people, workers, trade unions, and employers across complex supply chains with up-to-date estimates and support informed wage negotiations

Our work on promoting Living Wages

Working with companies, NGO's & researchers

- Providing customised quarterly datasets
- Giving ongoing support, contextualised wage data in relation to Minimum Wage, Living Wage and Adequate Wages

Ongoing funding for publication

- Using corporate & non-corporate funding to publish estimates till 2026 and beyond
- Channeling part of Living Wage sales revenue to continue publication

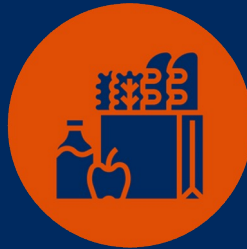
**Typical

We calculate our estimates based on cost-of-living data collected
